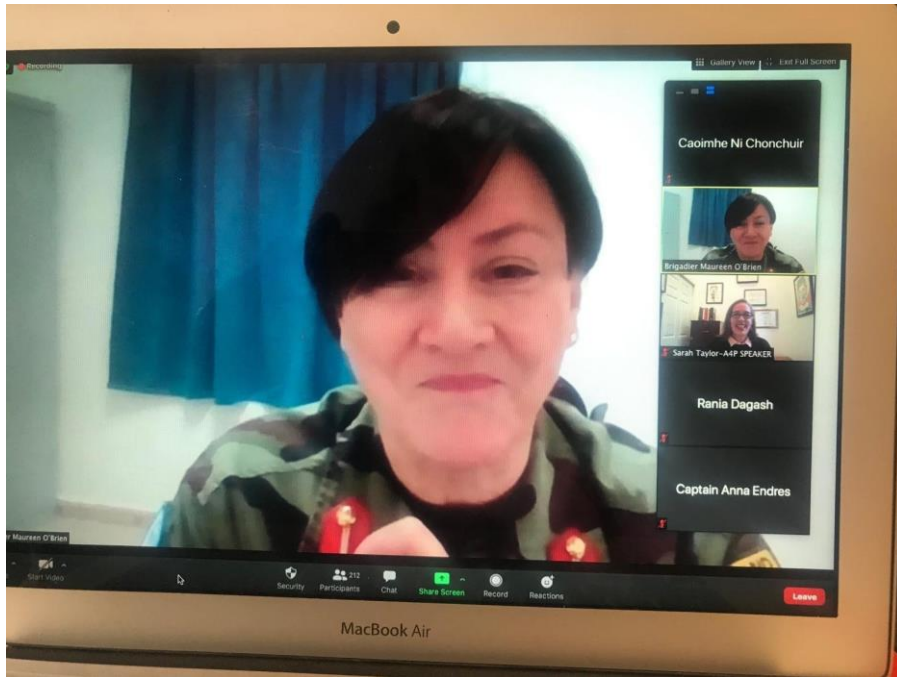
Security Council

On 1 January 2021, Ireland officially took its seat at the UN Security Council for a two-year term. UN member states have entrusted Ireland with a significant responsibility to help maintain and promote international peace and security. Ireland's tenure on the Council will be guided by three principles: Building Peace; Strengthening Prevention; and Ensuring Accountability. Women, Peace and Security will be a priority for Ireland, which has been confirmed as co-chair of the Security Council's **Informal Expert Group (IEG) on Women Peace & Security (WPS)** alongside Mexico.

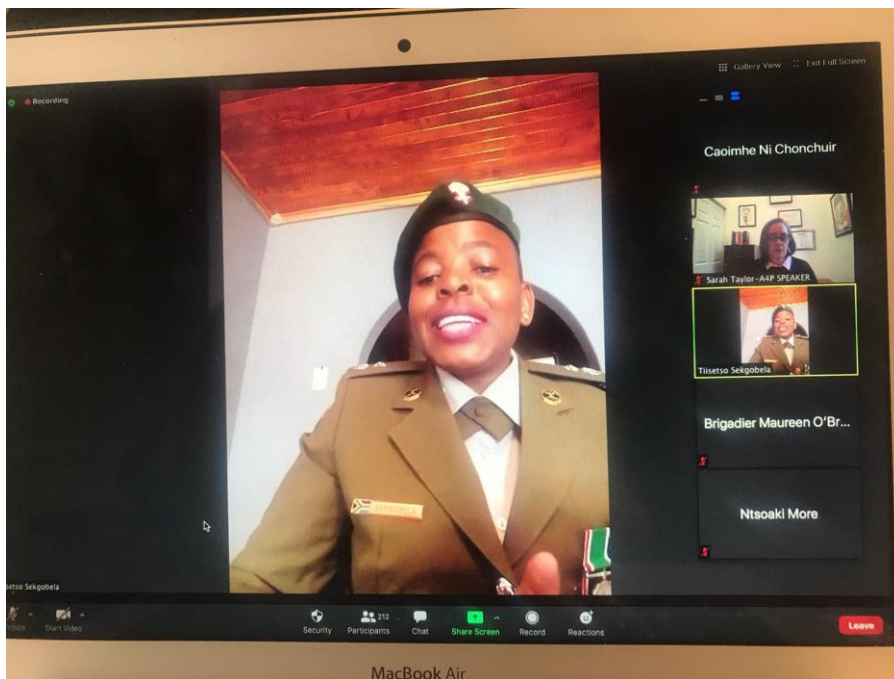


Other Events

On the **25 January**, over 250 participants including NGO, civil society, as well as a large variety of Member States representatives and UN colleagues took part in an interactive and open discussion on the barriers to the greater participation by women in peacekeeping. The ***“Breaking Barriers - Women in Peacekeeping”*** event was organised by Ireland and co-sponsored by Germany, South Africa, Bangladesh and Namibia. With over sixty years of peacekeeping experience, Ireland knows well the importance and urgency of increased female participation in all areas of peacekeeping operations. During the discussion, it was acknowledged that increasing women’s participation has to focus not just on numbers but also on understanding and putting in place measures that will bring about the institutional and structural transformation that is necessary to achieve the goal of gender equality across the system.

Peacebuilding Fund

On 26 January, Minister Coveney, announced at the **High-Level replenishment conference for the Peacebuilding Fund** that Ireland will provide €10m to the UN Peacebuilding Fund from 2020-2024, a 33% increase in our average annual contributions. Women and youth empowerment are investment priorities of the PBF Strategy 2020-2024 and the UN PBF has allocated 40% of its investments in 2019 to gender-responsive initiatives. Speaking at the conference, Minister Coveney noted: “The Peacebuilding Fund can help prevent conflict before lives are lost and costly peacekeeping interventions are needed, and sustain peace in fragile contexts.”
