Message from the Consul General

A chairde,

Participation in the Ireland 2016 programme of commemorations has been a deeply fulfilling experience. We have been brought together in a special way this year, both in Ireland where over one million took part in the Easter Sunday events in Dublin, and here in the Southeast of the U.S. where more than 25 excellent events were organised.

It was important that our programme should recognise the full complexity of our history and represent a wide range of perspectives on this seminal period. I am also glad that we focused on the inspiring idealism of the women and men of our revolutionary generation. I wish to thank you all.

In a range of ways large and small, *Ireland 2016* has brought us closer, strengthened us and readied us for the road ahead.

According to the Irish Independent, Ireland is on track to be <u>Europe's fastest growing economy</u> in 2016. This assessment was based on CSO statistics reflecting a <u>third quarter GDP growth of 4.0%</u> quarter-on-quarter over 2015, These figures are the first estimate of growth in the Irish economy since the Brexit referendum, indicating a more benign initial impact than initially anticipated.

<u>Speaking with Bloomberg's John Mickelwait</u> during a 3-day business programme in the U.S., Taoiseach Enda Kenny provided fascinating insights on Ireland's positions on Brexit, tax and EU Membership.

In a <u>wide-ranging keynote speech</u> to the <u>European Movement Ireland</u> on 15 December, Foreign Affairs Minister Charlie Flanagan reiterated Ireland's position as part of "Team EU", his remarks also addressing emergent Populism, Syria, Ukraine and the migration crisis.

Ireland announced the allocation of <u>€14 million in humanitarian funding</u> to the UN Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF), a vital lifeline for humanitarian operations around the world.

The Government released its first <u>Progress Report</u> on the <u>Programme for a Partnership Government</u>. This Programme, published in May, sets out detailed actions and commitments of the Government for tackling the nation's most pressing challenges "to make people's lives better in every part of Ireland."

Building on the success of Ireland 2016, the Taoiseach <u>launched the Creative Ireland Programme</u>, a major cross-governmental initiative and legacy project that seeks to inspire creativity and expand access to cultural activity across Ireland. It aims to enable the creative potential of all children; empower creativity in every community; spur investment in creative and cultural infrastructure; elevate Ireland as a centre of excellence in media production, and enhance Ireland's global reputation abroad.

The Minister for Arts, Heritage Regional, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs, <u>Heather Humphreys TD</u>, <u>paid tribute</u> on New Year's Eve to all of those across public life and civic society who helped make *Ireland 2016 Centenary Programme* a big success, saying "the experience of this year has reminded us all of the transformative power of culture...to tell our very different stories, to heal divisions, to bring communities together, and to strengthen our identity."

<u>Coca-Cola</u> was presented the Foreign Direct Investment Company of the Year award by IDA CEO, Martin Shanahan, at the annual Business and Finance Irish Business Awards 2016.

Ireland published a summary of its <u>legal arguments in the Apple State Aid case</u>, on which it disagrees with the European Commission's characterization of Apple's tax treatment by the Irish Government.

Four U.S. Irish Americans were among eleven worldwide honored by President Higgins at the Presidential <u>Distinguished Service Awards</u> for Irish Abroad ceremony at Áras an Uachtaráin on 12 December.

Congratulations to Caitriona Balfe, Ruth Negga, Colin Farrell and the Sing Street movie on their <u>Golden</u> <u>Globe nominations</u>.

2016 has been the best year ever for overseas <u>tourism to Ireland</u>, with the latest estimates indicating 10.5 million people will have visited Ireland, up approximately 11% over 2015.

Norwegian Air was granted a long-sought foreign carrier permit by the US Dept. of Transportation for <u>direct</u> <u>US flights to Cork</u> and will launch a low-cost service from/to Boston in July, with plans to add New York and Shannon routes.
