

#### **Irish News**

President Michael Higgins began a week-long visit to the US with a <u>speech to the UN</u> on Ireland's <u>commitment</u> to peace building and contributions to the UN.

Tánaiste and Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade, Simon Coveney, welcomed <u>EU Chief Negotiator Michel</u> <u>Barnier</u> and 500 participants to the fourth plenary meeting of the <u>All-Island Civic Dialogue on Brexit</u>. Minister Coveney also <u>addressed the Londonderry Chamber</u> of Commerce and met with community organizations on concerns around Brexit. The latest Government Brexit Update is available <u>here</u>, and you can sign up for the next Update straight into your mailbox <u>here</u>.

On behalf of the Government, Minister Coveney condemned the fatal pedestrian <u>incident in Toronto</u> and extended condolences to the families, friends and loved ones of the victims.

Minister Coveney also <u>condemned the chemical attack</u> in Syria. Ireland pledged an additional €25 million this year in humanitartian funding to Syria, bringing its total contribution to over €100 million since 2012.

Minister Coveney issued a statement <u>calling for restraint and calm in Gaza</u> following the deaths of nine Palestinians.

Agriculture Minister Michael Creed announced the <u>opening of the Chinese beef market</u> to exports from Ireland, a huge new opportunity for the Irish beef sector.

The <u>EU & Mexico</u> have renegotiated a new Free Trade & Investment Agreement. More positive news for Irish exporters!

<u>Irish forklift manufacturer Combilift</u>, with US headquarters in Greensboro, NC, has opened a new €50 million global headquarters and manufacturing facility in Monaghan, creating 200 jobs.

Minister for Culture, Heritage & the Gaeltacht, Josepha Madigan, announced plans to invest €1.2 billion in our culture, heritage and language infrastructure as part of Project Ireland 2040.

Minister Madigan also announced the approval of €882,000 in funding to Culture Ireland for the promotion of Irish arts worldwide in 2018. Award recipients for spring projects including in the US Southeast can be found <a href="https://hee.com/hee/bea/bases/

The deadline for this year's 2018 Presidential Distinguished Service Awards for the Irish Abroad is this Monday 7 May. All unsuccessful 2017 nominees will automatically be considered again.

Miami-based Celebrity Cruises' ship, <u>Eclipse</u>, more than twice the length of Croke Park, will home-port in Dublin, bringing an estimated €5 million to the economy.

New data from the Central Statistics office indicates the <u>number of overseas visits to Ireland</u> for the 1st quarter of 2018 was over 1.92 million, an increase of 6.9% compared to 1<sup>st</sup> quarter 2017.

On April 28<sup>th</sup> Aer Lingus celebrated 60 years of transatlantic travel and 6 new routes in the last two years, including Dublin-Miami.

On April 13<sup>th</sup>, <u>Ellis Island Family History Day</u>, we were reminded that about one-third of the population of the US are descendants of the immigrants who came through that island, with 10% claiming Irish ancestry. LARRY CALLAHAN, CEO OF PATTILLO INDUSTRIAL REAL ESTATE—FROM MULLIGANS ROSSLEA, COUNTY FERMANAGH TO ATLANTA, GEORGIA



"Daniel Callahan was my fourth great grandfather. He lived from 1770 to 1860 in Mulligans Rosslea in County Fermanagh, NI. His son, Thomas L. Callahan, rented another house, pictured here, with his father in Annagulan, Roslea, County Fermanagh, NI, for a period; he lived from 1801 to 1849. A flax grower, he was my third great grandfather.

"His son, James Callahan, moved to Aghalurcher Parish in Fermanagh; this is a hamlet on the road from Cavan to Enniskillen. He lived from 1831 to 1885. James' son Edward lived from 1869 to 1946. Edward was the émigré who moved to America and settled in Memphis, where he was a Fire Captain. His son, William Robert Callahan, was my grandfather. Among other things, he was a professional baseball player who pitched for the Cincinnati Reds. He lived from 1900 to 1980. His son, William Robert Callahan, Jr., is my father, born in 1933 and still living.

"And I was born in Pennsylvania, moving to Atlanta when I was in high school, finishing at St. Pius High School where I was a running back for the football team. I graduated from Georgia Tech with highest honors and then earned an MBA from Indiana University. I met my wife Cathy at St. Pius, and we have been married for almost 41 years now. She is more Irish than I and gave me three wonderful children. Laura is an attorney working for the State Department, Tom has an MBA from Notre Dame and Tim is an attorney in Washington, DC."
