FOLLOW THE RULES

There may be long queues for public transport and stadiums. Arrive early and follow advice from the local authorities.

BE RESPONSIBLE

Avoid unnecessary risks – steer clear of trouble, drink responsibly and be respectful when engaging with local authorities.

DRIVE SAFELY

NZ roads are often narrow with many hills and curves. Drive to the conditions, keep within speed limits, and carry your driver's license with you at all times when you are driving.
