#### Happy St Patrick's Day, Beannachti Lá Fhéile Pádraig,

After a flurry of snow, March is upon us and here in the Embassy, we are looking forward to all the events coming up this weekend and next week. Last night, I was delighted to be able to launch Seachtain na Gaeilge at The Old Oak, where we enjoyed great ceol agus craic in good company and I tried my hand at cúpla focail as gaeilge, which didn't go down too badly with the large and forgiving crowd, míle buiochas and I will try to be better next year!

This has been an interesting few weeks for us here in Belgium, with lots more high level visits,



demonstrating the increasing bilateral importance of this relationship. Our Brexit team from HQ met with their Belgian counterparts and found much in common, our Irish Aid colleagues met with their Belgian colleagues to discuss potential collaboration in Africa and Minister Helen McEntee, Minister for Europe, was here for her first Bilateral Visit to Belgium, taking in both Brussels and Antwerp over two jam-packed days with us. Many of you may have met her at the Alumni networking event, which

we were pleased to host at the embassy, where she spoke eloquently, both about Brexit but also on the Future of Europe and the Citizens Dialogue on which she has been leading in Ireland, encouraging our diaspora here to also engage in that debate. The Minister also met with the new Women Ambassadors Network of Brussels, which together with some of my female colleagues I have helped to establish – on 8 March for International Women's Day, Foreign Minister Reynders invited us to a panel discussion at the Egmont Palace at which he welcomed the establishment of our network. When she met the group, Minister McEntee spoke about the important role of women in politics, diplomacy and international affairs and the efforts that Ireland is making in this regard.



As a woman ambassador here, only our second woman ambassador to Belgium since Mary Tinney back in 1978, it was very empowering for me and indeed for all the female ambassadors who met her, to have the Minister speak and to hear her commitment to gender equality. The Minister also had some political meetings and she addressed a High Level Ireland/Belgium Brexit Summit for businesses at the iconic Port of Antwerp,

which we organised together with Enterprise Ireland and Beleire and our friends in Flanders Investment and Trade. I also want to thank our Honorary Consul in Antwerp Yves Rombouts for his great support in organising this event. This was a great event with over 100 business leaders and was a useful and timely exchange of views on common challenges and our approaches to preparedness for Brexit and supporting our businesses. I was especially proud to be speaking on an all-female panel at this event, together with Minister McEntee, the CEO of Enterprise Ireland, Juile Sinnamon, and Tonia Van de Vyver of FIT.

It's been a time of speeches, as I was delighted on Tuesday to talk with visiting business students from Waterford IT about the range of our work here in the embassy and Ireland Belgian relations. I also talked about a career in diplomacy and hopefully did not put them off considering one! As a

And last week, after the Minister and her team had left Antwerp, I headed back to The Atomium, to talk to Belgian food media and bloggers about the wonderful Irish beef that the Chef in The Atomium restaurant, Alexandre Masson, is now serving, as he has become a member of the Bord Bia "Chefs Irish Beef Club". Having sampled some of the delicious new menu, I would highly recommend it. And I can report that the inside of the Atomium restaurant was turned green for the occasion, so I will be

counting that as one of our "greenings" this year, along with The Grand Place in Brussels, The Celtic Cross at Fontenoy, The Belfry in Mons, the Lille Gate in leper, The City Hall in Dinant and the Burg in Bruges. We are proud to be participating again, with our colleagues in Tourism Ireland, in the Global Greening initiative and look forward to seeing all these Belgian icons turn green, thanks to the Belgian authorities. I will also have the honour of dressing the Manneken-Pis in his Irish costume again this year and am hoping to see many of you there on Sunday afternoon 18 March at 4:30 pm; who knows, I may even dress to match!



Last Friday, as the snow came down I was in the beautiful city of leper, to meet the Mayor and his colleagues and to visit the In Flanders Fields Museum. Once again, I was struck by the inclusive approach of Belgium to these catastrophic events of war and the important lessons which must resonate with us all today. I was pleased to learn that the Museum is considering a Summer School and a

Transition Year programme for Irish young people and I will be looking forward to hearing more about this valuable idea, so that the terrible losses of past wars are not forgotten and that the coming generations understand the European peace project, which has delivered the European Union in which we all now have so many opportunities to travel, work, study and prosper. We were talking about identity and place the other night here in yet another fascinating <u>Book Club</u> discussion and all were agreed that Belgium is a welcoming place and a place where it is possible for Irish people to feel at home. I have certainly felt that and as I approach my first St Patrick's Day here, I am feeling very grateful, grateful for my role, for my brilliant team here, for the chance to get to know some of you here and for the kindness and welcome my family and I have enjoyed since last summer from Irish friends and friends of Ireland in Belgium. So, enjoy all the St Patrick's Day celebrations and we hope to see you in the embassy at one of our events again soon.

# Greening of the Lille Gate in leper/ Ypres

The leper College of Burgomaster and Aldermen have decided that the Lille

Gate will be lit in green for the first time from Friday 16 till Monday 19 March 2018 as a part of Tourism Ireland's Global Greening Initiative, in partnership with the Embassy of Ireland to the Kingdom of Belgium. # Greening of the Celtic Cross in Fontenoy

The Cross was erected in 1907 to commemorate the famous battle of Fontenoy in 1745. It's a memorial to all the Irish on both sides who lost their lives in the battle. Listed by UNESCO since 1999, Mons Belfry is a remarkable example of local architectural history. 

### Darkness into Light comes to Brussels 12.05.2018 | 04:00

Please join the Irish and wider international community in bringing the Darkness into Light fundraiser to Brussels for the first time. Wake up and walk with us **on Saturday May 12**<sup>th</sup> **2018 at 4am in Parc Cinquantenaire.** 

Darkness into Light began when a bereaved couple from Dublin, rose at 4am to walk into the dawn in memory of their

son, who tragically died by suicide. Since 2009 the event has grown from 400 people in the Phoenix Park, Dublin to a worldwide event in over 150 towns and cities across Ireland, China, Canada, Australia and beyond.

Funds raised from the Brussels Darkness into Light Walk will jointly benefit Pieta House - an Irish Suicide Prevention organisation - and two Belgian organisations sharing similar values - Centrum ter Preventie van Zelfdoding and Centre de prevention de suicide.
