TRAINING VISA

Your visa application must be completed on the internet beforehand.

Documentation required when applying for a training visa to travel to Ireland.

PLEASE NOTE THAT ALL DOCUMENTS LISTED BELOW
MUST BE INCLUDED WITH THE APPLICATION
AS INCOMPLETE APPLICATIONS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

All documents listed <u>must be **ORIGINAL**</u>.

All documents (except for your banking statements and payslips) must be in **ENGLISH** <u>or</u> accompanied by a translation.

	Documents required
1.	Application form completed in full, signed and dated by you, the applicant.
2.	Your original passport, valid for 6 months after your date of departure from Ireland.
3.	Two recent colour passport size photos.
4.	Original carte de séjour or a certified copy, valid at least 3 months after your return date of departure from Ireland.
5.	Processing fee (cheque or mandate payable to 'Ambassade d'Irlande') Note: For postal applications fee of 8€ and a self addressed envelope for return of your passport and documents.
6.	Full details of the reason for your visit and relevance to employment/studies.
7.	An <u>original</u> , <u>signed and dated letter on official headed paper</u> from the company/organization in Ireland confirming that you will be following the training and including details of the nature, dates, place and duration of the training. Note: The letter should be dated within the 4 week period immediately prior to your date of application.

8.	An <u>original</u> , <u>signed</u> and <u>dated letter on official headed paper</u> from your employer or college confirming that you will be in training and outlining its relevance to your employment or course of study, and confirming that you will be returning there following your visit to Ireland. Note: The letter should be dated within the 4 week period immediately prior to your date of application.
9.	Written evidence from either your employer/college and/or the Irish company/organization showing who will be responsible for all costs (including travel, accommodation and expenses). Insurance covering accident and repatriation should be included for students.
40	If you are responsible for the costs of the trip, evidence of how you intend to finance your trip and support yourself for the duration of your visit in the form of up to date bank statements for the 6 month period immediately prior to your visit, and 3 payslips or evidence of income.
10. (a)	Bank Statements should include the most recent transactions for the account up to the date of your application and: (i) must be original (ii) must show your current address and (iii) must show a positive credit. Lump sum lodgements made shortly before your application will not be considered.

(b)	In the event that you are being supported by a spouse partner or member of your family, they should provide: (i) evidence of funds in the form of bank statements as outlined in 10 (a) above (ii) an original, signed and dated letter stating that they are undertaking to support you during your trip to Ireland (iii) evidence of their relationship to you and copy of passport.
11.	Students, retired and unemployed people are required to have international travel insurance (accident and repatriation) to cover them during their stay in Ireland.
12.	Details of any previous applications you have made for an Irish visa including those refused.

13.	If you have been refused a visa for any other country details of this should be submitted.
14.	A written undertaking both from yourself and your reference that you will observe the conditions of your visa, that you will not become a burden on the State, and that you will leave the State on the expiration of your permission to remain, please note your daytime phone number.
15.	Official evidence of any grant you may benefit from.

The Visa Officer reserves the right to request additional documentation, if required, in support of your application. The provision of all of the documentation listed in no way guarantees that a visa will be granted.
