Travelling to Australia for the Women's World Cup? This leaflet contains information to help you stay safe & make the most of your time down-under.

PRE-MATCH WARM UP:

Check your passport!



Make sure your passport has at least 6 months validity before you travel.

If you need to renew yours, do it now:

Get your visa!





Citizens can usually apply for an Electronic Travel Authority (ETA) issued by the Australian Department of Home Affairs:

Subclass 601 Electronic Travel Authority (homeaffairs.gov.au)

There is no application charge, but a service fee of A\$20 may apply. ETA processing times can vary, so apply for your visa well in advance of your travel date.

It's a game of two halves. We do passports, they do visas. The Embassy of Ireland in Canberra or the Consulate of Ireland in Sydney cannot assist with Australian visas.

Don't take chances!

Purchase travel insurance for the duration of your trip.



In case of emergency, Irish residents (not inc. Northern Ireland), can access Australia's public healthcare system, but only if you have the following:

1. Irish passport

<u>you-bring-it-in</u>

2. European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) with the initials IE

However, Australians also have a very strict approach to public order and behaviour, so be mindful of this when out and about.

Australia is also very strict on what you can and can't bring into the country – no shamrocks for good luck unfortunately!

You can drive in Australia using your Irish driving licence as long as you remain a temporary overseas visitor.

You must carry your driving licence and passport when driving and make sure you have sufficient motor insurance.

Driving laws and regulations differ in each state/territory. Driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs is illegal and the penalties are severe.

In the days around the games, we will have consular support teams in each of the cities where Ireland are playing.

The Embassy and Consulate can provide the following support:

- · Issue emergency travel documents if you lose your passport
- · Provide support if you have been arrested or hospitalised
- Get in touch with your family or friends on your behalf
- · Provide details of local lawyers if you need one

We cannot provide funds, legal advice or medical advice.

In case of emergency

You can contact the emergency services in Australia by dialling 000 (police, ambulance, fire services).

Be familiar with how your travel insurance works and keep the details safe. Cooperate with Australian authorities and public services.

We will have a consular presence on the ground in Sydney, Perth and Brisbane for Ireland's football games.
