Message from the Consul General

A chairde,

October was a great month. The Consulate team marched with the Irish community for the first time in the Atlanta Pride Parade, affirming Ireland's commitment to LGBT+ rights. This was an important statement of values to which Ireland is committed.

We also had the privilege of bringing Ambassador Dan Mulhall to Raleigh, North Carolina where he delivered a Krasno lecture at UNC Chapel Hill on "Ireland, the European Union and Brexit: what now?", promoted commercial ties at Research Triangle Regional Partnership and Raleigh Chamber of Commerce events and met with U.S. Congressmen Price and Holding. He also called on Ireland's largest local company, ICON Plc, spoke with IQVIA and SAS about their investments in Ireland and met with NC State Chancellor Randy Woodson to encourage intensification of research and student exchange collaboration. The Irish community hosted the Ambassador for a reception and GAA training session and he joined Woodson for NC State's victory over Boston College.

To mark the 300th anniversary of the start of the Scots-Irish migration to America, the Consulate organised a lecture tour by renowned Scots-Irish historian Billy Kennedy, taking in several venues in Atlanta and Knoxville and the Tourism Ireland stand at the Stone Mountain Highland games.

We also celebrated the life and work of Frederick Douglass, including his time in Ireland, while kicking off a programme of events to mark his 200th birthday. The Consulate was pleased to co-host and participate in a panel discussion at Atlanta's historic Morehouse College. We now look forward to co-hosting with Emory University's Rose Library "Frederick Douglass: A Bicentennial Tribute", a major programme of community readings and remembrances, on November 27th. 















Celebrating the 200th birthday of Frederick Douglass

Irish News

Michael D Higgins was elected for a second 7-year term as President of Ireland, with a total of 822,566 votes (55.8%).

The White House has officially nominated <u>Edward Crawford</u> to become the next US Ambassador to Ireland.

Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport, Shane Ross T.D. and Sport Ireland CEO John Treacy visited the White House this week for an international <u>summit on doping in sport</u>.

On October 17th, Tánaiste and Minister for Justice and Equality Simon Coveney welcomed in guests to mark 100 years since the birth in Ireland of <u>Chaim Herzog</u>, the sixth President of Israel. Days later, he offered deep condolences to those impacted by the tragedy at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, saying "we stand together with all decent thinking people against this kind of hatred and intolerance."

While attending the Irish Network USA 6th Annual National Conference in New Orleans, Ambassador Dan Mulhall <u>inteviewed with WWLTV</u> on the contribution of Irish immigrants to America & the dynamic two-way economic ties between Ireland & the US today. The theme is also covered in his latest blog post.

The Ambassador was pleased to meet and pay tribute to former Coca-Cola CEO Neville Isdell for the work he has done in founding <u>Dublin's EPIC Museum</u> which tells the story of Irish emigration, and for his achievements as chair of America's World Wildlife Foundation.

The Government's <u>Budget 2019</u> will deliver a 25% increase in infrastructure investment, funding for increased staffing across state agencies and key Irish embassies (including new Consulates in Los Angeles and Vancouver), and the first balanced budget in a decade. Read the Tánaiste's <u>remarks</u> to the Dáil on the Budget's implications for the work of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

As part of the Government's plan to drive balanced regional economic development under Project Ireland 2040, the <u>Technological University of Dublin</u>, Ireland's soon to be largest university and first ever technological university, will launch on January 1, 2019 upon dissolution of the Dublin Institute of Technology, Institute of Technology Blanchardstown and Institute of Technology Tallaght.

Noting the new Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change Special Report on the Impacts of Global Warming of 1.5°, the Minister for Communications, Climate Action and Environment, Denis Naughten, outlined Ireland's goals for climate action and adaptation.

Minister Michael D'Arcy, as Minister of State for Financial Services and Insurance, launched a <u>public</u> <u>consultation process</u> to inform the development of a new strategy for the International Financial Services (IFS) sector to drive the further growth and development of the IFS sector in Ireland.

Tánaiste Coveney's BBC interview on Brexit is essential listening; hear it here (8.10-8.20).

Enterprise Ireland plans to open <u>a new US office</u>, reflecting the value of investment by Irish companies in the US which jumped by 72% in 2017. Ireland is the 9th largest source of foreign direct investment to the US.

The Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Michael **Creed** TD, congratulated Irish applicants and their partners in the US and Northern Ireland that were recently <u>selected for project funding</u> from the USDA's National Institute of Food and Agriculture call for proposals under the <u>US-Ireland Research and Development Partnership Programme</u>.

Georgia Agriculture Commissioner, Gary Black, met with Consul General Stephens and Ireland's Agriculture and Food Counsellor, Dale Crammond, to mark the second leg of a Georgia-Ireland reciprocal exchange of

Government veterinary experts. We are delighted to see agricultural cooperation intensifying between Ireland and Georgia.

The <u>Research Triangle Regional Partnership</u>, which this month hosted Ambassador Dan Mullhall in North Carolina, will lead a high level state and academic delegation to Ireland next week to explore collaborative opportunities in life sciences, agriculture technology and innovation.

The Minister of State for Equality, David Stanton, has launched a Public Consultation on the <u>National LGBTI</u> <u>Inclusion Strategy</u> to improve the lives of the LGBTI community in Ireland. The overall aim of this strategy is to target discrimination, promote inclusion, and improve quality of life and wellbeing for LGBTI people.

The 2020 Aer Lingus College Football Game will take place in Dublin's Aviva Stadium on August, 29th, 2020 between Notre Dame and Navy. The Game is expected to draw 35,000 Irish American fans. Official information, travel packages and tickets available here.

Diaspora Heritage Series

My family roots in Ireland run deep and I am proud of my dual citizenship, American and Irish.

My grandmother, Brigid Sweeney, was a first-generation immigrant, and my most recent relative to be abroad. Brigid was born in 1903, to Patrick Sweeney and Annie Roarty. Both of Brigid's parents hailed from the small village of Meencorwick in County Donegal. Around the age of 23, my grandmother emigrated to New York and passed through Ellis Island on her own. Shortly after her arrival, she met Anthony Greene, who was born in Bayonne, New Jersey but was raised by his parents Patrick and Sarah on Cruit Island, Donegal.

Brigid and Anthony were married in 1927 and settled in Brooklyn with their children Anthony and my mother, Anne. My Grandfather (Popa) worked as a laborer in New York City including working on the Brooklyn Battery and Lincoln Tunnels. Bridget (Nana, formerly Brigid) worked as a dietician in Brooklyn hospitals.

My father, Bill, can also trace his entire lineage back to Ireland. Each of my father's grandparents emigrated to the United States from Ireland in the late 19th century and took residence in and around New York City. Frank Brannigan, my paternal great grandfather, was born in County Monaghan and arrived in the United States in 1890, at age 22. He married Anna Gaynor, an immigrant from Donegal, in 1895 and later had three children. Frank spent decades working as a night watchman at the New York docks. His daughter Anna, an operator for AT&T, married Thomas Duffy, a milkman, and had my father William in 1921. Frank Brannigan's son, Frank Jr,. grew to be a decorated Lieutenant with the FDNY.

My father, a World War II navigator of B-26's who completed 67 missions in the European Theater while earning two Purple Hearts, and my Mom, met in Brooklyn and were married for 55 years before Mom passed away in 2003. They had five children and 9 grandchildren. My Dad turned 97 on October 16 of this year.

I am the proud husband of Cathy (37 Years of Adventure) and daughters Erin (husband Tim) and Caitlin. I have been blessed with a career in sports that has lasted 30 years, and which leads me to conclude with if you love what you, do you won't work a day in your life.
