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Message from the Consul General

A chairde,

I wish to introduce you to Eilís O'Keeffe, Ireland's first Vice Consul in Atlanta. Ms O'Keeffe is from Dungarvan, County Waterford and studied Law with French at University College Cork and University of Oxford. She has a nice turn of phrase *as Gaeilge* and has come to us straight from three years working in support of the Good Friday Agreement in the Ireland, UK and Americans Division of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade in Dublin.

Ms O'Keeffe's appointment will double Ireland's diplomatic team for the Southeast U.S. It is part of the implementation of 'Global Ireland – Ireland's Global Footprint to 2025', the Government's initiative to double the scope and impact of Ireland's global footprint in the period to 2025. In these parts, this policy has also seen the diplomatic team at our Consulate General in Austin, where Mr Paul Breen has been appointed as Ireland's first Vice Consul for Texas and the Southwest. On the ground, we are also seeing a significant up-scaling of engagement by Enterprise Ireland & IDA Ireland in the Southeast.

Our Vice Consul's expertise will come in handy for a visit to Atlanta from Northern Ireland this month. In partnership with the Oxford College of Emory University, the Northern Ireland Bureau, Washington, and the UK Consulate General, Atlanta, we will welcome Mr Colum Eastwood, leader of the Social Democratic and Labour Party, Mr Mike Nesbitt, former leader of the Ulster Unionist Party, and Mr Stephen Farry, Deputy Leader of the Alliance Party for a programme to mark the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Good Friday Agreement. They will participate in a public panel discussion on September 18<sup>th</sup> at the Oxford College. They will be following in the footsteps of John Hume in several respects so I am glad that a screening of *John Hume in America* will kick off their discussion.

The Tánaiste and Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade, Simon Coveney, T.D. has welcomed President Trump's planned visit to Ireland in November. He said that "The US President is always welcome in Ireland. Our two countries have such strong historic, economic, cultural and family ties. Maintaining those connections is always a top priority."

The Tánaiste also reacted to the US decision to end all funding to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA). He stated that "I believe this step is both heartless and dangerous, and will impact negatively on the Middle East region."

Read the <u>Tánaiste's recent speech</u> to the German Ambassadors Conference.

Irish Ambassador to the US, Dan Mulhall, said he was honoured to represent Ireland at the <u>funeral of John McCain</u>, noting "The senator was a great ally and friend of Ireland both on immigration reform and on the NI peace process." The Irish ballad "Danny Boy" was sung at the funeral.

On August 25<sup>th</sup> <u>Taoiseach Leo Varadkar</u> welcomed <u>Pope Francis</u> to Ireland. See <u>photos of the Pope's visit</u>, his <u>visit schedule</u>, and <u>other background information</u>.

Eoghan Murphy, Minister for Housing, Planning and Local Government issued a <u>Presidential Election Order</u> setting out key dates in connection with the forthcoming Presidential election, with 26 September as the last day for receipt of nominations.

In early July in New York, the Taoiseach, accompanied by the Tánaiste, officially launched <u>Ireland's campaign</u> <u>for a seat on the UN Security Council</u> for the 2021-2022 term. This bid is a core element of the Government's Global Ireland 2025 strategy to double the scale and impact of Ireland's international presence.

<u>The President</u>, <u>the Taoisech</u> and the Tánaiste were among those from Ireland who paid tribute to former UN Secretary Kofi Annan as an advocate for peace and multilateralism following his recent passing.

Negotiations between the EU and the UK for an agreed Brexit are ongoing. In July, the Government signed off on a number of <u>preparedness measures</u> focused on East-West trade.

President Trump and the President of the European Commission met in Washington on July 27<sup>th</sup> and issued an important joint statement. This addressed starting a new phase in the relationship between the U.S. and the EU, a "phase of close friendship, of strong trade relations in which both of us will win, of working better together for global security and prosperity, and of fighting jointly against terrorism."

This has been a great summer for Irish sporting achievements. Our <u>Women's Hockey Team</u> came second in the World Cup. Five Irish athletes, Rhys McClenaghan, the O'Donovan brothers, Thomas Barr and Shane Ryan, brought home medals from the <u>European Championships</u>. The future of Irish sports is also looking strong. The Ireland women's <u>4x100m relay team</u> (Molly Scott, Gina Akpe-Moses, Ciara Neville and Patience Jumbo-Gula) won silver at the World U-20 Championships in Finland in July.

The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade launched its first 'Annual Report on Support for the Irish Abroad,' which details the range and depth of Government support for global Irish communities.

The US Citizens and Immigration Services has changed its US <u>Unlawful Presence</u> policy for students and exchange visitors with J, F or M visas who fail to maintain their lawful status.

<u>The Irish economy grew 7.2% in GDP terms</u> in 2017, making Ireland the fastest growing economy in the EU in that year. Labour Force Survey data also shows <u>the highest ever level of employment in Ireland</u>. Official data further indicated <u>an increase of 7.8% in overseas visits</u> to Ireland for the first seven months of 2018 as compared to the same period in 2017.

Ministers Humphreys and Breen welcomed the signing of the <u>Economic Partnership Agreement</u> between the EU and Japan, the biggest and most advanced bilateral trade deal ever negotiated by the EU which will create the largest free trade zone ever.

At the <u>official opening of Avolon's new global headquarters</u> in Dublin the Taoiseach remarked "Travelling the world, I know when looking to the skies that 4 out of every 10 aircraft are owned or managed from Ireland." Worth over €4.1bn to the Irish economy, <u>Ireland's aerospace and aviation industry</u> is soaring to new heights.

A "cheesy" new joint venture is planned between Irish company <u>Glanbia Nutritionals</u>, which has operations in Florida, and US-based Dairy Farmers of America and Select Milk Producers, Inc, investing \$470 million in a cheese & whey production facility with 250 US jobs in Johns, Michigan.

September 21<sup>st</sup> is the deadline for nominations for Science Foundation Ireland's 2019 <u>St. Patrick's Day Science Medal</u> – which goes to US-based scientists with an Irish connection.

Registration is open for the Florida Chamber Business Development and <u>Trade Mission to Ireland</u> and the UK Dec 3-7.

<u>Conde Nast Traveler</u> has ranked 3 Irish cities - Dublin, Cork and Galway - among the top 10 friendliest cities in the world!

# Sligo Lady and Offaly Gentleman Meet in Chicago and Create a Family That Makes Beautiful Music Together

A red haired young woman at the young age of 19 left her small town of Gurteen, County Sligo, Ireland on July 23rd, 1955 to meet her older sister and find employment in the big city of Chicago. If you saw the movie Brooklyn, you will know some of the story already. She did not come on the boat, but flew across the ocean from Shannon Airport to Detroit and eventually arrived in Chicago. She traveled with one brown suitcase that contained all the belongings should could take with her. Included was a bottle of Red Breast Cognac for her sponsor, Marian Callaghan, and the first machine knit sweater her cousin Lizzie Nicholson made for her. A black suit was purchased from a secondhand shop for the trip, but was returned the next day so that her own mother could have a little more in her pocket as things were difficult in Ireland at the time. The jobs that were available, mostly farm jobs, went to men. There was very little opportunity for women, which led to the difficult decision her older sister made to move to Chicago to find work.

After receiving letters from her older sister explaining how lonely it was in Chicago, she decided to make the long trip to the U.S. Her plan was to stay for 5 years and then return home to Gurteen as she was "promised" to a man who owned and farmed land near her homestead.

She took her first job in Chicago with U.S. Steel as a file clerk. It was on a bus that transported employees of U.S. Steel to the "L" where she met her future husband. She credits another Irish man, Ben Cummins, for setting up the meeting. She played "hard to get at first," walking by the seat on the bus that was so obviously being saved for her!



They found their way into the social circles of the Irish in Chicago, attending the dances held at the Regeant, and Carpenter's Hall where Irish Bands played waltzes, swing, and traditional Irish music for a céilí dance...with The Siege of Ennis being a favorite. It was their mutual love for Irish music and dancing that ultimately brought them together.

He had the "Irish gift of the gab"! As he rang every Tuesday night and talked for hours. He would talk to whomever got on the phone first and the sisters often wondered who he was really interested in.

On November 20, 1956 Mary Elizabeth Mulligan (Betty) turned 21. On this day, Joseph Patrick Dowling (Joe) proposed to Betty. Joe emigrated in 1953 coming from Tullamore, County Offaly Ireland via boat to Newfoundland and then to Toronto, Canada where he worked for a year. In 1954 he took the train to Chicago and joined his brothers - Mike and Christy - who had left Ireland before him.

Betty and Joe were married on September 12, 1959 after an appropriate year in mourning was completed for Betty's mother, who passed away that Betty and Joe became engaged. Betty and Joe had 4 children; Martin William, Teresa Mary (yours truly), Christina Brigid and Joseph Jude (Jode).

But you should know that one of Betty and Joe's grandsons, Teresa's son Patrick Finley, has carried on the family tradition as a two-time All-Ireland champion, first place finisher, in the Fleadh Cheoil na hEireann (All-Ireland music competition) for Under 18 Fiddle, and Fiddle Slow Air. And he recently participated in the over 18 competition as well!
