Irish in Wales Online Community Event



The Consulate were proud to host many of you at the inaugural online "Irish Community in Wales" gathering on the 30th of September. This event was the first in a series that we will host with and for the many Irish people, groups and communities in Wales, and we are keen to <u>hear your feedback</u> on it and ideas for future themes.

The evening was a mix of conversation and music, and we were honoured to hear from Minister for the Diaspora, Mr Colm Brophy TD as our first guest. He spoke about the

Irish Government's diaspora policy and long-standing supports and took questions from the attendees. Another active question and answer session followed with Ms Rosie Keane from the Embassy of Ireland in London, covering the situation for Irish people living in Wales after Brexit.
