# **OFFICIAL OPENING EVENT**



On October 22, Minister for Foreign Affairs, Simon Coveney TD, officially opened the Consulate's new offices. A key task on arriving in Cardiff in 2019 was to identify and fit out a suitable permanent premises. While COVID led to some delays in this process, we think you'll agree that it has been worth the wait! We very much look forward to hosting community, political, cultural and business events with you in the months and years ahead.

Our continuing vigilance over COVID meant that guest numbers were restricted, so we are very pleased now to be able to share the event with you online. With live musical performances from Catrin Finch & Aoife Ní Bhriain and messages of support from across Ireland and Wales, the special recording brings together the many varied strands of the Ireland / Wales relationship.



Welcoming the official launch, Minister Coveney said:

"The re-establishment of the Consulate is testament to Ireland's commitment to increasing cooperation and collaboration with Wales across the business, arts, sporting and community sectors."

"Ireland and Wales are the closest of neighbours, and we have a strong and positive relationship built on age-old connections and a deep cultural understanding. Our modern and vibrant relationship has grown from historic links, common heritage and culture, and close people-topeople, business, cultural and sporting connections."

Minister Coveney was joined by First Minister Mark Drakeford and Consul General Denise Hanrahan for the official unveiling of a commemorative plaque marking the occasion.



#### **IRELAND - WALES FORUM**

As part of the October 22 visit, Minister Coveney led the Irish Government's attendance at the inaugural Ireland-Wales Ministerial Forum, hosted by the Welsh Government. The Forum is a high-level annual event established to engage political, economic and broader stakeholders to build relationships, reflect on ongoing collaboration and consider opportunities for further cooperation. The creation of the Ireland Wales Forum was a key commitment of the Ireland-Wales Shared Statement and Joint Action Plan 2021-25.

First Minister Mark Drakeford said on the day:

"The Forum is a symbol of our joint commitment to strengthening our existing ties at political, economic and cultural level. These talks are another example of bonds strengthening between the two Celtic countries. I look forward to continuing to build on our existing relationship and deepen co-operation with our closest European Union neighbour".

The meeting provided the opportunity to bring together Irish and Welsh Ministers to exchange views and approaches on critical issues. It covered recent political events & bilateral relations, trade promotion & economic development, and energy & climate action.

Climate action, COP 26 and sustainability were key themes, including sharing of knowledge about Wales' experience of the Future Generations Act. At a lunch event, delegates heard from the Future Generations Commissioner Sophie Howe and from speakers from the Future Leaders Academy. Minister Coveney was accompanied by Minister for Trade Promotion, Robert Troy TD and virtually by Minister for the Environment, Climate and Communications, Eamon Ryan TD.
