A WORD FROM CONSUL GENERAL SARAH MANGAN

A chairde,

Welcome to the fourth newsletter from the Consulate General of Ireland. It has been an eventful few months since our last newsletter in July, with lots of positive developments as we saw a great deal of activity for the Irish in the North of England, including on the sporting field with the Rugby League World Cup, and on the culture front – check out our story below on Culture Ireland's activities in the region.

However, the autumn started on a sombre note. In September we joined with our British friends to mark the passing of Queen Elizabeth II. Ireland was represented at the Queen's funeral in Westminster by President Michael D. Higgins and Taoiseach Michael Martin. It was a time to reflect on the Queen's contribution to relations between our islands. As President Higgins said in his statement on the death of the Queen, "we remember the role Queen Elizabeth played in celebrating the warm and enduring friendship, and her great impact on the bonds of mutual understanding, between our two peoples."

The last few months have been busy ones. As trailed in our last newsletter, on 30 September the Consulate General convened a special gathering of Irish community and cultural organisations from across the North of England, which we entitled 'Community, Connectedness and Sustainability'. We were joined at the Irish World Heritage Centre in Manchester by over 100 representatives who contributed to thoughtful discussions on a range of topics. We finished the day with a positive sense of the vibrancy of the Irish community in this part of the world.

Official relations between Ireland and the North of England were further boosted by a number of visits in recent months. In October, Colm Brophy T.D. Minister of State for Overseas Development and Diaspora, visited Liverpool where he met with many in the Irish community and attended the Liverpool Irish Festival. While we had the first ever Irish naval visit to Newcastle with the L.É. William Butler Yeats docking in Tyneside. We had a real highlight to close out the year with the visit by An Taoiseach Micheál Martin in November. The Taoiseach was in the North of England to attend the British Irish

Council meeting in Blackpool, but made time in his schedule to meet with Irish community representatives from across the North of England at an event organised by the Consulate in Manchester.

There have also been some changes to our Consulate team. We welcomed Alish Underhill as our new Executive Assistant and Public Diplomacy officer. Alish hails originally from Tipperary but has been settled in St Helen's for a number of years. Sadly we are losing Dean Cavanagh, who finishes with us this week as he moves to Blackpool for family reasons. Dean was the Consulate's first locally engaged employee and has made a significant contribution to establishing the Consulate. We hope to have a replacement for Dean in place in the New Year. We also welcomed a new Ambassador in London. Ambassador Martin Fraser has already been on the road and made visits to Liverpool, Leeds and Manchester since his appointment – see more details below.

This month we are delighted to see the return of <u>To Be Irish...At Christmas</u>. It is fast becoming the go-to website to find out everything that is happening in Ireland and in the overseas Irish community. If you are heading home over the Christmas period, be sure to check out the events taking place in Ireland, and if you are staying put, there are plenty of online events you can participate in from Christmas crafts and cookie making to Christmas concerts.

Visit by An Taoiseach

We had a real highlight to close out the year with the visit by An Taoiseach Micheál Martin in November.

The Taoiseach was in the North of England to attend the British Irish Council meeting in Blackpool, but made time in his schedule to meet with Irish community representatives from across the North of England at an event organised by the Consulate in Manchester.





New Ambassador

Martin Fraser took up post as Ambassador of Ireland to the United Kingdom in August, and was up to the North of England very soon after.



In September he visited Liverpool, where he met with the Institute of Irish Studies and visited the Liverpool Irish Centre.





He was in Manchester on 30 September where he addressed the Conference of Irish Community Organisations, and was back again in October for a meeting with Mayor Andy Burnham and Leader of Manchester City Council Cllr Bev Craig.



And he visited Leeds in October, including the Tuesday lunch club at Leeds Irish Centre and Leeds Irish Health and Homes.

Conference of Irish Communities

The inaugural Conference of Community Organisations for the North of England took place in September in the Irish World Heritage Centre in Manchester.

The Conference was the first of its kind to take place in the region and aimed to support, energise and connect groups with each other and with the newly established Consulate General to deepen the relationship on the ground.


The day allowed for the acknowledgement of the contribution made by organisations in supporting the Irish community abroad during the COIVD crisis and in furthering the

Rugby League World Cup

The Men's Irish Rugby League team – the Irish Wolfhounds – arrived in the North of England for the Rugby League World Cup tournament in the autumn.



After a stunning victory against Jamaica in their first game of the tournament at Headingley Stadium, they faced some tough opposition from Lebanon and New Zealand and sadly didn't progress to the next round. However their time in the North of England was memorable and they were made to feel very welcome at their home base in Leeds.



Visit of Minister of State Colm Brophy to Liverpool



In October we welcomed Minister of State for Overseas Development Aid and Diaspora, Colm Brophy T.D. to Liverpool. The Minister had a number of engagements around the Liverpool Irish Festival and at Institute of Irish Studies. Minister Brophy also met with Steve Rotheram, Mayor of Liverpool City Region, who visited Dublin with Mayor Andy Burnham at the end of March.



The Minister's programme ends with a visit to the Liverpool Irish Centre and a meeting with Irish community leaders.

Naval Visit in Newcastle

Irish Naval Service vessel LÉ William Butler Yeats was docked at Spiller's Wharf, in October with members of the public allowed on board.

The ship, constructed at Appledore Shipyards in Devon, and crew, under the Captaincy of Lieutenant Commander Paul Hegarty, are usually patrolling the high seas.

However, the docked in Tyneside to host a range of events in collaboration with the Consulate General of Ireland, and as part of the Tyneside Irish Festival.

The visit celebrated the strong Ireland – North of England relationship and in particular the recent establishment of the Consulate General of Ireland for the North of England.

It was a rare opportunity to visit an Irish navy vessel, meet the crew, and learn about the Irish Defence Forces and their experiences of seafaring.













Remembering the Irish who served in World War 1


Consul General Mangan participated in two events commemorating the contribution of men and women from the island of Ireland in the First World War. As part of the consular corps in Manchester, she attended the annual Remembrance Sunday service at the Manchester cenotaph.



On 2 September, CG Mangan was honoured to lay a laurel wreath at the grave rededication service in Southern Cemetery for Nurse Hilda Peare, where Cllr Dave Rawson recalled her contribution to the war effort. Nurse Hilda Florence Letitia Peare was born in Co. Wexford in 1894. In 1915 after the outbreak of the First World War she joined the Dublin Detachment of the Voluntary Aid Detachment Unit (V.A.D). Like many

before ner, and tens of thousands since, she travelled from Ireland to England to Work as a nurse, joining the war effort with many of her countrymen and women. As a nurse in the V.A.D she worked at 2nd Western General Hospital in Manchester. Whilst nursing the sick and wounded of the armed forces she contracted Scarlett fever and sadly died on March 13, 1917, aged 23 years. Hilda was buried at Manchester Southern Cemetery with full Military honours, a gun carriage and firing party being supplied by the Commanding Officer of the Heaton Park Depot. Nurse Hilda Florence Letitia Peare is commemorated as a Commonwealth War Graves Commission casualty and recently received a CWGC Headstone at her place of burial.

Cultural Ireland events



Culture Ireland, the organisation that promote Irish arts worldwide, has been very active in the North of England in recent months. In October, Culture Ireland supported an exhibition by Irish artist Aideen Barry at The Whitaker Museum & Art Gallery in Rossendale. The Whitaker has another Irish connection with its collection including exhibits on Irish patriot Michael Davitt who grew up in nearby Haslingden.



Culture Ireland also ran a showcase of Irish musicians as part of the <u>English Folk Expo</u> in Manchester in October. You can check out snippets of performances by <u>Clare Sands</u>, the <u>Daoirí Farrell Trio</u>, <u>Dani Larkin</u>, and <u>Moxie</u> on our Twitter feed.



In November Culture Ireland representatives were back in the North of England to announce a three year partnership with <u>Huddersfield Contemporary Music Festival</u>, which will see a special focus on Ireland, providing a high profile platform for Irish contemporary musicians to reach new audiences.

The scholarship makes additional contributions to travel and accommodation costs.

Available to anyone resident in England, Scotland or Wales, applicants must demonstrate

- a keen interest in learning the Irish Language at any level of ability
- a commitment to the Irish speaking community in Britain

To apply, applicants will email no more than 500 words, in English or Irish, answering the following questions:

- 1. What does the Irish Language mean to you?
- 2. How would this scholarship help you in the pursuit of learning the language?
- 3. How do you intend to contribute to the Irish speaking community in Britain when you return from your course?

Decisions will be made and communicated in April 2023, by a panel of members from *The Institute of Irish Studies* and *Conradh na Gaeilge Learpholl*. The panel will take into consideration reducing cost barriers for those otherwise unable to attend; geographical bias in award giving and impact of the Irish speaking community in Britain."


FOREIGN BIRTHS REGISTER UPDATE

The processing of Foreign Birth registration has resumed in Dublin on a phased basis. Applications that have been sent to the FBR team have been securely held and will now be processed in strict date order.

At present, due to the complex nature of the Foreign Birth Registration and the pause in the service due to the Covid-19 restrictions you should allow approximately 2 years for processing of Foreign Birth Registration applications at this time.

PASSPORT ONLINE SERVICE



The Passport Service is now directing all Irish citizens to use the online system to complete their passport applications for both first time applications and renewals.

The expanded online service now includes:

- First time applicants Adults, minors, and renewals/replacements over 5 years outdated
- Renewing a passport that expired within the last 5 years
- Renewing a passport to change your name
- Replacing a passport that is lost/stolen/damaged/visa pages are full.
