We would like, first of all, to acknowledge the guidance and cooperation of our colleagues in each of foreign ministries in the countries to which we are accredited. At a challenging time for everybody, they have been professional and helpful at some very difficult junctures.

We would also like to express our appreciation to our Honorary Consuls in Manama and Muscat for the great work they have been doing on behalf of Ireland and the Irish communities.

A particular word of thanks to our EU and UK colleagues, with whom we have co-operated in helping Irish citizens return home, with flights via Amsterdam, London, Paris, Rome, Vienna, Zagreb, Zurich and other destinations.

We would also like to pay tribute to the Irish communities themselves who have risen to the occasion and, like Irish people at home, have responded in a measured and sensible way to this crisis. It is especially important that we stay in touch with each other at what is a challenging and stressful time. Irish business networks, societies and GAA clubs across the region continue to work on behalf of the wider community; we are very grateful to them for their ongoing support.

While the priority right now is to overcome this global crisis, Ireland is also preparing for the post-COVID-19 recovery phase, with a whole-of-Government response which includes a range of supports to facilitate businesses getting up and running as quickly as possible once this emergency has passed.



In that context, we are both, with our Embassy teams, already looking at how we will consolidate and grow Ireland's presence, profile and network of relationships in the Gulf region in the post-COVID-19 world.
