TERMS OF REFERENCE

1. Introduction

Ireland through its Embassy in Hanoi has been supporting landmine and unexploded ordnance (UXO) clearance in South East Asia since 1998, with an ongoing programme in Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar and Vietnam. The most recent independent evaluation of the Embassy's engagement in the sector was conducted in 2015. The review noted that all programmes reviewed were proceeding according to approved workplans and achieving jointly agreed outputs. Evidence of broader development impact on the lives and livelihoods of beneficiaries was significant. The review recommended that Ireland should continue to support mine and UXO clearance in Southeast Asia, with greater engagement in technical and capacity support to grantees and regulatory agencies.

In line with the recommendations of the evaluation, Ireland has continued to support work in this sector during the period 2017–2020 with over €5 million allocated to support humanitarian mine action (HMA) in Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar and Vietnam and more recently to mine risk education. The programmes have been implemented by the HALO Trust, UXO Lao, Mines Advisory Group (MAG), and Project RENEW respectively.

In consultation with the Department of Foreign Affairs in Ireland and other stakeholders, the Embassy will develop a new Strategy to guide its actions in the Mekong Sub Region for the period 2022-2026. The Strategy inter alia, will consider whether and to what extent Ireland should maintain a development cooperation programme and if so, consider which areas of activity should be prioritised.

To coincide with the development of the new 2022-2026 Mission Strategy, the Embassy intends to carry out an independent review of its support to Humanitarian Mine Action in the period 2017 – 2020. The purpose of the review is to assess the efficiency and effectiveness of programmes over the period, to draw conclusions on whether continued support over the period of the next Strategy would be warranted and if so, to make recommendations on the potential shape and mechanisms for delivery of such support.

2. Background –Support to Humanitarian Mine Action in South East Asia

Cambodia:

Cambodia remains one of the most landmine and Explosive Remnants of War (ERW) affected countries in the world, largely as a result of extensive mine-laying during nearly two decades of fighting that concluded in 1998. Cambodia hopes to reach its target of achieving mine free status by 2025. However, access challenges remain in the mine belt along the Cambodia-Thai border. Post-clearance land in Cambodia is being used mostly for agriculture & infrastructure. Ireland has been supporting landmine and unexploded ordnance (UXO) clearance in Cambodia through support to Halo Trust over the periods 1994-2002 and from 2006 – present, through the Irish Aid programme managed by the Embassy of Ireland in Hanoi. Over

the period 2017-2020, Ireland has provided €2 million in support of mine action activities in Cambodia, focused on manual minefield clearance in the north-west of the country (along the border with Thailand) and on mine risk education (MRE).

Lao PDR:

Lao PDR is, per capita, the most heavily bombed country in the world. During the Second Indochina War between 1964 and 1973, more than 2 million tonnes of ordnance was dropped on the country, including about 270 million cluster munitions (or bombies). Some 75 million unexploded bombs were left after the war ended. Several decades later an estimated 87,000 square kilometres of land remains potentially contaminated with UXO.

The Embassy’s support for UXO clearance in Laos began in 2006. For the period 2017 - 2020, the Embassy contributed a total of €2,000,000 to the Multi Donor Trust Fund administered by UNDP Lao to finance the project “Moving toward achieving SDG 18 – Removing the UXO obstacle to Development in Lao PDR (2017-2021)” which aimed to improve physical security leading to progress to the achieving of Lao PDR’s national Sustainable Development Goal No 18. The project was aimed at achieving enhanced support to livelihood activities for affected populations, improved efficiency of clearance operations, progress in the effort to establish a national baseline of UXO contamination, improved transparency in financial and results reports and improved coordination of sector activities through enhanced management of information.

While the most effective way to prevent casualties is to clear unexploded ordnance for good, the reality in Lao PDR is that people desperately need to use lands for farming and have no choice but to enter dangerous and contaminated areas whether it be to gather firewood, cultivate crops or to care for their livestock. Ireland’s funding has therefore supported community efforts which teach villagers how to live in the midst of the unexploded ordnance in areas yet unreached by clearance activities.

At a policy and strategic level, the contribution from Ireland has supported the capacity building of the Lao National Regulatory Authority for the UXO and Mine Action Sector. This organisation is mandated to coordinate the UXO sector, to ensure that international treaty obligations are being met and to develop policies and national standards to ensure the high quality of survey and clearance activities. The National Regulatory Authority played a crucial role in introducing a new evidence-based survey methodology, and is constantly providing oversight and guidance to all survey operators including UXO Lao.

Myanmar:

Vast areas of land in Myanmar are currently contaminated by landmines and other unexploded remnants of war as a legacy of decades of armed conflict between the national government and a wide range of ethnic armed groups. Communities are still reluctant to leave Internally Displaced Peoples’ Camps due to fear of unexploded ordnance and mine contamination. Mine action is a vital component of broader strategies to secure sustainable peace in Myanmar as it emerges from conflict and instability. At the same time, mine action is a sensitive sector. Therefore, the focus for mine action in Myanmar has been on the roll out of mine risk education.

Over the period 2017 – 2020, through the Mine Action Group (MAG), Ireland provided €210,000 to support mine risk education and awareness of unexploded ordnance in Kayah State. Ireland’s support to date has helped to raise the awareness of vulnerable children and adults to the dangers of unexploded ordnance and mines.

Vietnam:

Vietnam is the second most bombed country in the world, with an estimate of in excess of 14 million tonnes of ordnance delivered during the Vietnam/American conflict. Nearly forty years after the end of the war, the Vietnamese Army estimates that there is still between 350,000 and 600,000 tonnes of Explosive Remnants of War covering approximately 15% of land surface area. This contamination continues to place communities at risk, restrict access to land required for housing, agriculture and infrastructure and constitute a barrier to equitable community development and poverty alleviation.

In Vietnam, the Embassy has funded the clearance of unexploded ordnance since 2007 and more recently mine risk education. Over the period 2017-2020, Ireland has provided a total of €800,000 to Project RENEW to implement the project ‘Victim Assistance/Disability Support and Mine Risk Education in support of UXO Survey and Clearance’. The project’s objective is to provide assistance to the war victims and families of people with disabilities (PWDs) and to provide mine risk education for children and the community in Quang Tri. Specifically, the project aims at (i) creating opportunities for PWDs to participate in vocational training and income generation activities, (ii) supporting UXO technical survey and clearance operations by providing the teams with accurate and timely UXO-related information, and (iii) contributing to the reduction and eventually elimination of UXO accidents among children and adults through public awareness and community participation.

3. Purpose and objectives

The **purpose** of the review is to assess the impact of Ireland’s support for the sector from 2017-2020 and the manner in which support has been delivered. The review should also provide the Embassy with recommendations for possible future engagement by Ireland in humanitarian mine action in the region (Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar and Vietnam) for the period 2022-2026. The findings of the review will feed into the discussions on whether and to what extent to continue support to the sector under the 2022-2026 Mission Strategy.

The objectives of the independent review are to:

1. Provide a quick assessment of key achievements and results, lesson-learnt of the Humanitarian Mine Action programmes supported by Irish Aid in Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar and Vietnam.
2. Provide a comprehensive mapping of donors working on Humanitarian Mine Action in Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar and Vietnam
3. Provide recommendations that can feed into the Embassy of Ireland’s discussion on possible continued support for the sector and how the efficiency, effectiveness and coherence of such support can be ensured.

3. Scope

The review will cover the Embassy's funded Humanitarian Mine Action programmes in Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar and Vietnam for the period 2017–2020. The review will cover these specific issues:

Achievements and Results

- High-level outcomes of the programmes across four countries.
- Key highlights of Ireland's contribution to the Humanitarian Mine Action sector through these funded programmes
- Key lessons-learnt for Ireland as a donor, particularly on different modalities of funding across four countries.

Policy brief and donor mapping

- Current government policies on Humanitarian Mine Action, including key updates and challenges.
- Mapping of donors working/supporting Humanitarian Mine Action sector.

Forward looking

- Options for modalities
- Opportunities/options for exchanges and cross learning in the region

4. Methodology and Output

The Review will be desk, interview and field based (where and when feasible).

The output expected is a concise report of not more than 30 pages addressing the above issues.

The review mission will be phased into (i) preparatory meeting to agree methodology, and logistic arrangements; (ii) orientation/briefing; (iii) interview and project site visits (where feasible); (iv) de-briefing to the Embassy; and (v) report writing.

It is noted that due to international travel restrictions, on-line/video meeting could be arranged for interviews.

Within four weeks from the start of the consultancy, the review team/consultant will prepare a **draft report** highlighting findings and providing clear and recommendations that can guide the Embassy's discussions on whether to remain engaged in supporting the Humanitarian Mine Action sector in the sub-region and if so, how best to pursue such engagement.

5. Timeframe

The tentative schedule for the review is from mid-April to the end of May encompassing a total of no more than 30 days work.

6. Selection Criteria

The professional service provider must have, and be able to demonstrate, the required technical, professional and skill base as outlined below:

- Minimum 5 years of professional experience in humanitarian mine action programmes, programme management and development issues across South East Asia;
- Fluent knowledge of English.
- Excellent communication and writing skills in English and an ability to produce clear and concise reporting;
- Demonstrated experience in completing similar assignments;
- Ability to conduct reviews and evaluations;
- Experience of engagement with other donors in the humanitarian mine action sector
- Sufficient human resources and technical capacity to deliver on the outlined scope of assignment.

Failure in any one of these critical requirements may lead to elimination from the competition in advance of further evaluation.

7. Tender Proposals

The following details are required:

- An outline of the proposed approach to address the Terms of Reference presented above, including methodology and an indicative timeline for each element of the work within the overall time parameters;
- Full detailed qualifications of the service provider, highlighting relevant skills and experience, and evidence of similar projects undertaken;
- Details of the key personnel to be involved in the different stages of the work, their role in these, and their relevant skills and experience
- A brief statement on how the service provider sees their skills matching the requirements
- Confirmation of availability and ability to meet the timescale indicated; and
- Financial submission, as per the details outlined in Appendix 1.

8. Award criteria

The contract for the requested services will be awarded on the basis of Most Economically Advantageous Tender. Marks will be awarded according to the award criteria outlined in the table below. Tenderers must score the minimum marks in criterion 1, 2 and 3 in order to be considered for awarding of the contract. Failure to achieve the minimum mark of 50% in criterion 1, 2 or 3 will result in the tenderer being eliminated.

Marks for cost will be allocated using the following formula:

The following provision will apply to any tie-break situation occurring in the evaluation process:

If the evaluation results in a tie between two or more Tenders, then the Tender with the highest overall 'Qualitative' score shall be deemed the Most Economically Advantageous Tender.

It may be necessary for the Embassy to request clarification of information provided in a tender. Tenderers may be requested to attend a meeting (via telephone or in person) to clarify their tender and provide the opportunity for the Evaluation Committee to ask questions. In such cases, the Project Officer will be responsible for managing and coordinating the clarification process. This clarification does not allow tenderers to revise their original offer and therefore no new or additional information will be requested or permitted during interview.

No document based, in whole or in part, upon the work undertaken in the context of the Contract awarded following this tender may be published except with the prior formal written approval of the Embassy.

Conflict of Interest
