On 14 December 1955, Ireland joined the United Nations. This year marks both the UN's 70th year in existence and Ireland's 60th year of membership.

In that time, Ireland and the world has changed so much. Through the UN, Ireland has played its role as a small but powerful voice for democracy, equality, peace, security and development.

To celebrate 60 years of active engagement in the UN, Ireland will host a number of public events, both in Ireland and internationally, to raise awareness and promote debate about our contribution to one of the most important and ambitious projects in world history.

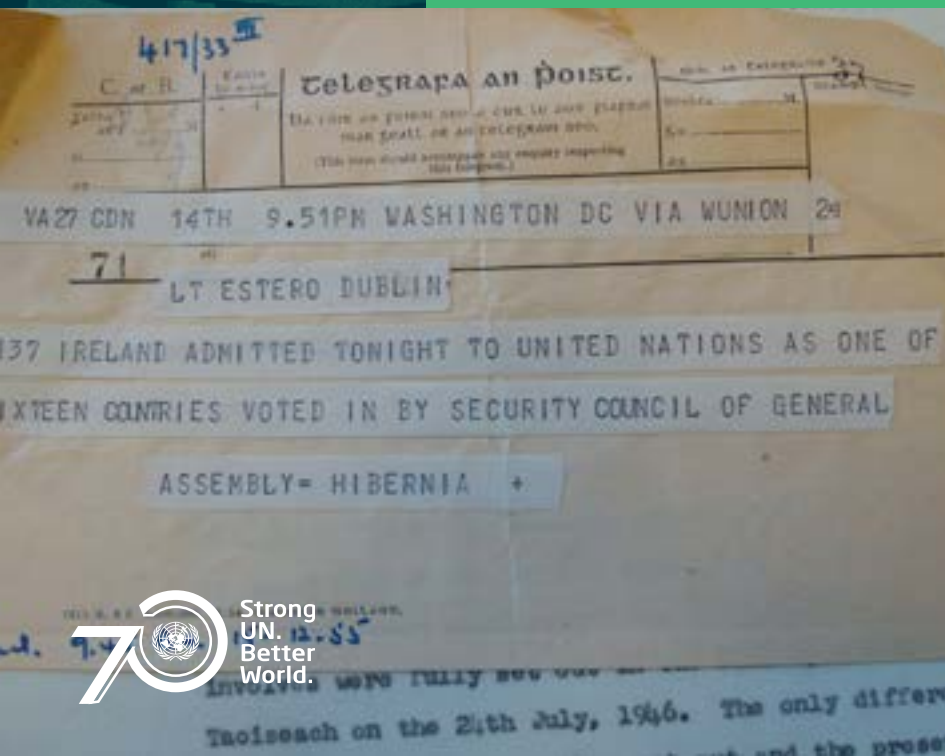
